
Are you New to Tesomas

- Units cook in their campsites Tuesday evening, so bring cooking equipment and personal mess kits.

- The health forms you turn in will remain at camp after you leave, so please provide us with copies and retain the originals.
- For your swimming experience, we have the beautiful spring-fed Crystal Lake (no pool).
- Units are encouraged to assist with camp-wide duties such as flag ceremonies, manning swim towers on the Waterfront, cleaning the shower building, and maintaining a respectable campsite.

Preparation Timeline

a schedule for proper unit planning

Right Now

- Submit your unit reservation and deposit to secure space (see page 8).
- Inform all Scouts and their parents about the dates for summer camp.
- Recruit at least two adult Leaders (both 21 years of age or older) to be in camp at all times during your stay. Recruit more if you will have 20 or more Scouts.

March & April

- Encourage those in need to complete a camp scholarship request. Request can be made online (samoset.org/aid) and are due April 15.
- Work with each Scout in planning an advancement schedule and getting them started with the pre-camp work listed online. **Merit badge signup opens March 15.**
- Non-Samoset Council Units must submit a copy of their Sickness and Accident insurance policy. A copy of this policy can be emailed to camp@samoset.org. Most councils provide this insurance and can provide evidence of coverage.
- **Camper Deposits are due April 15. All remaining fees are due June 1 to the Samoset Office.**
- Pre-order t-shirts to ensure that everyone will have one to wear at camp. Shirts orders are due by May 10. Shirts can be customized with your unit number or other text (see page 5).
- If desired, complete a pre-camp swim test (see below).

May

- Send out final camp notices to all parents including a list of what to bring (see page 6).
- Have committee members visit parents of Scouts not registered to encourage their attendance with your unit, with another unit, or with the provisional unit.
- For Samoset Troops, send in your Adult OA Nomination by May 1.
- Ensure that all Scouts and Leaders will have their medical forms completed (see page 9). Also, have the medication form completed for those Scouts taking medication at camp.
- Complete special dietary requests for all Scouts requiring special meals (see page 10).
- Add any additional campers to your registration and submit your final unit payment (due June 1).

Two Weeks Before Camp

- Collect all medical forms (ensure that we will be able to keep a copy) and medication forms. You may send copies (NOT originals) of all these to camp two weeks prior to your arrival.
- Check up on each Scout's pre-camp advancement work.
- Make final advancement changes up until two weeks prior to camp.
- Hold an inspection of personal packs and equipment. Also, prepare unit equipment for camp.
- Remind the Scouts of the behavior standards necessary for a Scouting event.
- Prepare multiple copies of your unit roster for camp and other leaders.
- Plan to arrive between 2:00 and 3:00 PM.

Pre-Camp Swim Tests

information on taking your swim test before camp

Units have the option to complete a swim test prior to their arrival.

- Each unit schedules and completes the swim tests prior to camp on their own. A BSA Lifeguard, Red Cross Lifeguard, or equivalent must administer the tests and certify the results.
- Forms and procedures for unit run swim tests are available online.

Preparation Suggestions

we strongly suggest you follow these in your planning

Leadership

- The safety of our youth is of greatest importance at camp. **Therefore, all adults accompanying a unit to camp must be registered as a leader, including completion of a criminal background check and youth protection training.** These steps should be completed with your local council.
- Have one additional leader, 21 or older (male or female) for every 10 Scouts.
- If your unit has any female youth, you must have at least one female adult (21 or older).
- All adults must follow the BSA Scouter Code of Conduct.

Arrival

- Complete an approved swim check before coming to camp (see page 7). Those individuals who plan to participate in waterfront activities will complete a swim test on Sunday if swim checks have not be copmleted prior to camp.
- Have all the heavy gear in one vehicle so that it can be taken to your campsite all at once.
- Have a copy of all medical forms in alphabetical order for camp to keep. If you mailed in the medical forms, they will be at the medical recheck station.

Advancement

- It is recommended that first year Scouts participate in the Eagle Quest Program and one or two merit badges.
- Second year Scouts who aren't First Class should sign up for Eagle Quest and merit badges.
- Be aware that OA candidates who are going through their Ordeal will miss all of their Thursday sessions. Talk with the staff for how to make these up.
- All Scouts should be given a copy of their advancement schedule. Leaders should also have copies for easy reference.
- Leaders should ensure each Scout has chosen programs according to their interests and ability.
- Schedule merit badges/activities carefully to allow travel time in between (i.e. avoid scheduling a shooting sports merit badge right before or after a COPE/climbing activity).
- All Scouts should be made aware of their prerequisites (see document on our website).
- All Scouts should review the merit badge pamphlet(s) before coming to camp.

Medical

- Scout Medication - complete for campers with medication and bring to camp.
- Special Diet Request - complete for campers with dietary needs at least 2 weeks in advance.

Registration & Fees

procedures and fees for registering campers

Unit Reservation Deposit

- A non-refundable fee of \$10 per camper is due with your reservation. These fees will be applied toward your camp fees.
- If your unit attending Tesomas has less than 50% of the site capacity, the Council reserves the right to assign another unit to use the patrol areas in that site not used by your unit.

Scout/Leader Deposits

- The first \$75 (due April 15) for each Scout/Leader is his/her reservation deposit and is non-refundable, but transferable to another Scout/Leader in the same unit as a new reservation.
- Remaining fees are due June 1.
- Campers registered after April 15 may be subject to a \$25 late fee (excluding new Scouts).

How to Register & Pay

- Please register all Scouts and Adults online using our online registration portal. If you need help accessing this portal, please contact our Scout Office at 715-355-1450.
- Fees may be paid online but are subject to a 3% convenient fee. Units can avoid this fee by mailing a check to the Samoset Office (3511 Camp Phillips Road, Weston, WI 54476). Please include a copy of your registration with any mailed payments.

Camp Scholarships

- Camp scholarships are available for those in need. Please use the campership request form on our website to request help. (Samoset.org/aid).
- Campership application (per person) are due by April 15.

Attending Tesomas with another Unit

- If a Scout is unable to attend with your unit, don't let them miss the summer camp experience. Register them with our provisional unit period 8 or with another unit any week (ask us for details).
- Scouts/leaders who want to experience a second week of summer camp may also register with our provisional unit or make arrangements to come to camp with another unit.

Refunds

- Camp fees are non-refundable as we encourage units to transfer fees to another Scout from the unit who is attending camp. However, the Samoset Council will consider each situation and endeavor to be as fair as possible. All refunds are calculated after the \$75 non-refundable deposit.
- Refunds must be submitted using the refund request form available online. Refunds will be credited to the unit's camp bill and the unit will be responsible for refunding fees to the individual.

Policies and Procedures

things to help prepare your unit for camp

MEDICAL POLICIES

- Every participant must provide a copy of their health form to be kept on file after they leave. **Parts A, B, and C are required for all Scouts and Adults attending Tesomas.**
- To speed up check-in, you may send copies (NOT originals) of all medical forms to camp two weeks prior to your arrival.
- Units can keep medication in a locked container at their site and distribute to their scouts. Units choosing to do so will be provided with a medication log sheet to fill out and turn in at the end of the week. Units are welcome to turn their medications into the health office for us to distribute.
- Bee sting medication, inhalers, an insulin syringe, or other medication or device used in the event of life-threatening situations may be carried by a camper.

Insurance

- When surgical treatment or hospital care is needed for Samoset Council Scouts/Scouters, benefits in excess of \$300.00 will be paid only if they are unrecoverable from any other insurance policy or service contract (i.e. family insurance policy). Therefore, it is imperative that you come prepared with the pertinent insurance policy information for every Scout/Adult.
- Non-Samoset Council Units must provide insurance information or proof of Council insurance.

Inherent Dangers

Everyone should be prepared for potential problems that are out of the control of the camp. There are a lot of natural hazards like rocks, roots, and branches that may cause injury if not cautious. Campers can avoid visits from animals by not allowing any food, drinks, or scented items in or near their tents. To avoid lost or stolen items, leave your valuables at home or have them stored securely in vehicles.

YOUTH PROTECTION POLICIES

Nothing is more important to the BSA than the safety of our youth members. We believe that even one instance of child abuse is unacceptable. The BSA is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for all. Youth protection requires sustained vigilance, and we work every day to protect children through mandatory policies.

- One-on-one contact between adults and youth members is prohibited.
- Privacy of youth is respected. Adult leaders and youth must respect each other's privacy, especially in situations such as changing clothes and taking showers at camp.
- The use of cameras, drones, etc., in places or situations where privacy is expected is prohibited.
- Separate tenting must be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth. Youth sharing tents must be no more than two years apart in age. Spouses may share tents.
- The buddy system should be used at all times. The buddy system is a safety measure for all Scouting activities. Buddies should know and be comfortable with each other. Buddies should select each other, with no more than two years' age difference and the same level of maturity.
- Hazing and initiations are prohibited and may not be included as part of any Scouting activity.
- No bullying. Verbal, physical, and cyber bullying are prohibited in Scouting.
- All sexual activity is prohibited in Scouting. Public displays of affection are prohibited.
- Appropriate attire is required for all activities.

FACILITY POLICIES

Dining Hall Procedures

- Units are assigned table(s) during check-in.
- Meals consist of the main entrées, sides, cereal at breakfast, fruit or vegetables, peanut butter (or substitute) and jelly, and a salad bar at dinner.
- All meals will be served cafeteria style and seconds will be available when announced.
- Grace will be said prior to each meal. As a sign of respect, we ask that you enter the Dining Hall quietly and with arms folded.
- Everyone is asked to wear the official Scouts BSA Field Uniform to all evening meals.
- The youth restrooms are located in the basement of the Dining Hall and the adult restrooms are located in the lower level of the Program Center.
- Guest meal tickets may be purchased for \$7 per meal in the Camp Office.



Please notify us of any special dietary needs or restrictions two weeks before your arrival using the “Special Diet Request” form available online.

Trading Post

- Here you will find all kinds of merchandise and collectibles. You will also be able to purchase additional toiletries, cooking supplies, and other camping necessities.
- You will be able to purchase candy, soda, slushies, and any other food items. The porch and picnic tables are there for you to enjoy your snacks. Please have your Scouts clean up after themselves!

Program Center

- Staff is generally available to answer questions in this building from 8:00 AM - 8:00 PM.
- The Program Center (PC) is open to all leaders 24 hours a day and serves as a leader’s lounge.
- Adult restrooms are located in the lower level; youth restrooms are located in the Dining Hall.
- Check out a vehicle pass if you need a vehicle past the parking lot gate later than Sunday.
- Campsite garbage bags, toilet paper, and cleaning supplies are available from the upper level closet. Lost & found is located in the downstairs. Valuable items will be kept at the desk upstairs.
- Wireless Internet is available for leader use. Personal computers may be used by Leaders, but we ask that personal equipment not be set up for extended periods of time.
- Visit the Archives Room in the lower level of the Tesomas PC for an interesting look at the great history and traditions of Tesomas, Tom Kita Chara Lodge, and the Crystal Lake Scout Reservation.

Health Office

- Available 24 hours a day in the lower level of the Program Center.
- For medication disbursement, please schedule appointments with the Health Officer while at camp.
- If the Health Officer is not available, report to the upper level of the Program Center for assistance.
- For information on medical forms and medical policies, see page 9.

Showers

- Shower buildings are located on each side of camp. (Shower facilities in Hanna Venture Base are for staff use only).
- Campers need to bring all their own toiletries or purchase them at our Trading Post.

Laundry

- A washer and dryer are available for unit use at the east shower building.
- A key can be checked out in the Program Center by any unit leader.

Cell Phone Coverage

- Cell phone coverage is good for those with Verizon or AT&T service.
- Scouts and adults are encouraged to bring a battery power pack to charge their phones.

OTHER POLICIES

Vehicles

- For the safety of the Scouts and Scouters, the speed limit on all camp roads is 5 mph.
- After dinner on Sunday one vehicle is allowed in your campsite. All other vehicles must be in the parking lot until Saturday. Parking is not permitted along any camp road.
- A daily “Vehicle Pass” must be obtained from the Program Center if a vehicle is needed past the parking lot after Sunday.



Bicycles at Tesomas

- Bikes must stay on camp roads, not trails. All riders will maintain safe speeds, yield to pedestrians, wear a buckled helmet while riding, and obey any signs.
- No bikes are allowed in main camp, program areas, or in campsites. When not in use, bikes near main camp will be stored in designated bike corrals. When not in use, bikes near the unit campsite will be stored off the road.
- Absolutely no riding after dusk without a light.
- All riders will need to read and sign an agreement form available at the Program Center. Any rule infractions will result in the individual losing their privilege to ride on camp property.

Mail / Email

- Please have mail addressed in the manner to the right. You are encouraged to mail things several days early to ensure we receive it before checkout day.
- If there is an emergency family issue, please call (715) 365-3111 and the Camp Director will ensure that the camper receives the message.

Leaving Camp Early

- Any Scouts leaving camp during their stay must have a release signed by their parent or guardian and approved by the Scout Leader.
- We recommend having this form (available online) completed before a Scout attends camp.
- When checking out, a member of the camp leadership must give the final approval signature.

Smoking

- Smoking is only allowed away from Scouts and other Leaders in the maintenance yard.
- This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers, or electronic nicotine delivery systems that simulate tobacco smoking.

Privacy

By participating in Samoset Council activities, you agree to allow Samoset Council to use your image in camp and council promotional materials.

Pets

- No animals are allowed on camp properties except for guide dogs for the visually impaired or animals which are for a program/demonstration with the approval of the Reservation Director.
- Pets will be allowed in designated Family Camp areas but must be leashed at all times and the owner is responsible to clean up after the animal.

Visitors

- All visitors must check in and out at the camp office.
- Visitors are not allowed between the hours of 9:00 PM and 7:30 AM.
- Visitors are encouraged Wednesday evening. Activities begins at 4:00 PM with a picnic style meal served at 6:00 PM for \$7 a plate. The highlight of the evening, the Order of the Arrow Calling Out Ceremony, begins at 8:00 PM.
- Visitors should not bring pets.
- Persons with disabilities should notify Tesomas prior to their arrival if accommodation is needed.

Emergencies

- In the event of a camp-wide emergency, the camp siren may sound. At which time, all campers should report immediately to their emergency area and await further instruction from the camp staff. The camp staff undergoes training in handling common types of emergencies.
- A camp-wide emergency situation will consist of any severe weather, wildfire, lost or missing campers, lost or missing swimmers, and any possible severe medical emergency. Anyone who becomes aware of an emergency situation or danger should notify the nearest staff member who will contact the appropriate camp leadership.
- Any information in regards to a bomb threat or unauthorized visitor should be reported to the Program Center immediately.

Damaged Camp Equipment

- Any damage to camp-owned equipment through abuse will be the responsibility of the unit
- Replacement costs will be assessed to the unit based on the retail costs of the damaged item. Units will be responsible for paying for damaged equipment before leaving camp.

Shoes

- Footwear is required everywhere in camp, except at the Waterfront.
- Closed toed shoes are required for Climbing and Shooting Sports.

Fires & Firewood

- Units are prohibited from bringing firewood into camp because it can harbor many different kinds of invasive pests and diseases harmful to our trees. Pests like gypsy moths and diseases like oak wilt are easily spread through infested firewood. Wisconsin is now faced with the very real threat of becoming the next state to discover the emerald ash borer within its borders.
- Units can gather downed wood or purchase firewood from camp.
- Fireguard charts are furnished for each campsite and must be filled out upon check-in.

Tents

- All units must provide their own tents.
- If you do not have a “No flames in tent” sign stenciled on your tents, you must display a “No flames in tent” sign in the campsite. We have a sign posted on each bulletin board.
- Separate tenting arrangements must be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth. Youth sharing tents must be no more than two years apart in age.

Arrival and Departure

how to check in and out of camp on your first and last days

With many Scouts and Leaders arriving and checking in at the same time, we need your help. We want to make this the easiest, fastest, and most efficient check in process you've ever experienced. Staff will be available in the parking lot and at various check-in points to assist wherever needed.

Check-In Process

1. Arrive between 2:00 and 3:00 PM on Sunday with your entire unit. A member of the staff will greet you in the parking lot. Units that would like to arrive on Saturday, may do so by contacting us in advance.
2. Move to main camp for medical rechecks and Dining Hall orientation. Be prepared to present a copy of everyone's medical form for camp to keep in alphabetical order at the medical recheck station.
3. Move into your campsite with your gear. Only one vehicle per unit will be allowed to go to your campsite at a time. Unit trailers are allowed and can be parked within the confines of your site.
4. Between 3:00 and 5:00 units may complete a swim test at the waterfront. This is required for anyone to enter the Waterfront area during your stay. Each camper will receive a "buddy tag" which must be used to enter the Waterfront. (You can come to camp wearing your swimsuit to save time and complete this before going to your campsite.)
5. Flag lowering will be at 6:20. After dinner a staff member will lead you on a tour of camp. This is a great opportunity for new Scouts to become familiar with the layout of camp and returning Scouts to be introduced to changes from previous years.

If your unit needs to arrive early, please contact the camp office at (715) 365-3111 to get approval. Units that arrive early are on their own until check-in starts on Sunday.

Check-Out Process

1. Sweep the floors and wipe down walls in the campsite latrine. Scrub and clean urinal, toilet seats, and washbasin. Be sure to wear gloves and wash hands afterward.
2. Wash and rinse picnic tables.
3. Return shovel, rake, broom, and other campsite supplies to the latrine.
4. Leave a complimentary woodpile for the next unit.
5. Pick up all trash in and around your campsite. Sort your trash and leave it tied by the road. Rinse out the waste receptacles.
6. Return any equipment borrowed from camp to the appropriate location.
7. Settle your unit's balance, pick up patches, medication, and troop photos at the Program Center.
8. Signup for Tesomas Summer Camp 2025.



Any Scout leaving prior to Saturday morning must have a completed Scout release form on file (requires a parent's signature). This form is available online or at the camp office.

Eagle Quest

superb first year camper program

Eagle Quest offers opportunities to help Scouts complete their Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class ranks.

The schedules allow the Scouts to select the requirements they need. Many of the Scouts participating in the Eagle Quest program will need the guidance of their leaders to remind them of their schedule.

The Eagle Quest schedule runs all day long to ensure that Scouts have the possibility to advance a full rank during their stay at camp. However, Scouts who only need help on a few requirements, can sign up for merit badges and come to Eagle Quest during open instruction. Open instruction is a good way to make up missed requirements or to complete new ones, but it is not a replacement for attendance at Eagle Quest. Some requirements, such as the cooking, the 5-mile hike, and the 1-mile compass course, cannot be completed during open instruction. Most requirements need one day for instruction and another for evaluation.



Special Notes of Attention

- Register Scouts online using the procedures found in the online help file. If they will be working on multiple ranks, sign them up for each rank they will be working on. Be sure to sign them up separately for cooking if your Scouts will be cooking in the area for that rank.
- Certain requirements will require the Scouts to dress properly for the activity. Swimsuit, towel, and shoes are needed for swimming requirements. Long pants are recommended for hikes.
- Certain requirements meet at other locations besides Eagle Quest. These locations are noted on the schedule. Please have your Scouts arrive on time and be prepared.
- Second Class requirement 3d (finding direction at night) will take place on Tuesday evening at 10:00 PM and Scouts are asked to meet at the Activity Field. If the weather doesn't cooperate, the staff will reschedule this requirement and make an announcement about the change.

Other Advancements

- Totin' Chip is offered Monday & Thursday at 3:30 PM (only need to attend one of these).
- Firem'n Chit is offered Tuesday & Friday at 3:30 PM (only need to attend one of these).

adventure for your older scouts

Micro-Trek is perfect for those who have already done much of what Tesomas offers, but still want to experience camp and some high adventure. Both tracks are Monday - Thursday all day programs.

- MT200 is for Scouts who are 13 years of age or older and First Class rank. Scouts will explore the “hidden gems” and the heritage of North-central Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.
- MT300 is for Scouts 14 years of age or older and First Class rank. This includes an overnight outpost experience on Tuesday.
- Units should register Scouts online. Each track is limited to 10 participants. Registration opens March 15 on a first come, first serve basis.
- There is an additional charge per person to participate (see amounts below). This amount is due at the time of registration in order to reserve a spot. This fee is refundable if the spot can be filled.

Sawmill Adventure Park*: Both MicroTrek 200 & 300 will spend the day going to the Sawmill Adventure Park in Wausau, WI. The adventure park houses an indoor trampoline park and mini golf.

Flambeau River Canoeing: Scouts will travel to Flambeau Canoe Base to spend the day paddling the flambeau river in Northern Wisconsin.

Outpost Overnight Adventure*: Participants will travel to Norway, Michigan where we will spend the next two days at True North Outpost. Tuesday will consist of Whitewater Rafting followed by setting up camp for the night. On Wednesday participants will experience natural rock climbing that is sure to get their adrenaline going.

Geezer Merit Badge

Have you always wanted to earn your own merit badge? Pick up a list of the requirements in the Program Center to get started exploring camp, participating in activities, and helping Scouts have a great camping experience. This program takes place throughout the week and will be an explosion of fun.

Tesomas Experience Merit Badge

Our camp’s mission statement describes our purpose as to share the Tesomas Experience, but in reality without you coming to camp there wouldn’t be much to the Tesomas Experience. This program is designed to help share the Tesomas Experience with you, and help you to share your Tesomas Experience with others.

Projects

Training

Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (Monday - Thursday, 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM, Eagle Quest): The course prepares leaders to teach the outdoor skills that Scouts need for Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class. This course is required for new Scoutmasters/ Assistant Scoutmasters to be considered “Trained” and recommended for Troop Committee members or Webelos leaders.

Paddle Craft Safety (Monday - Thursday, 9:00 AM - 10:30 AM, Tesomas Waterfront): This BSA training expands *Safety Afloat*, as well as the knowledge, needed for a unit leader to confidently supervise canoeing or kayaking excursions on flat water.

Swimming and Water Rescue (Monday - Thursday, 10:30 AM - 12:00 PM, Tesomas Waterfront): Going beyond *Safe Swim Defense*, this training will provide leaders with information and skills to prevent, recognize, and respond to swimming emergencies during unit swimming activities.

Adult COPE (Monday - Thursday, 10:30 AM - 12:00 PM, COPE & Climbing): Learn fun games and activities that you can share with your scouts or use to run a more engaging and entertaining troop meeting. Don’t be confused by having an intense amount of fun with adults from different troops. This Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience is not all fun and games; it’s fun, games, and social.


